

Juan Diaz was selected as Junior Scholar by the Stone Center on Socio-Economic Inequality and awarded \$5,000 to support his research on the immigrant experience of the Ecuadorian community in New York City. His research also examines the socio-economic and structural barriers faced by first-generation Latinx immigrants, and the policy alternatives that could foster social capital and increase upward mobility among first-generation children and youth. Juan will participate in the Stone Center's activities, including its seminar series and events. The Stone Center at the CUNY Graduate Center supports research on topics related to socio-economic inequality.

Juan was also selected over the winter break as a Research Assistant for CUNY CARES, and a Research Assistant with the Silberman School of Social Work at Hunter College to conduct research on a study that examines the impact of cooperatives in the economic development and family dynamics of immigrant domestic workers.



Student Spotlight: Scott Petersen

Let's Have a Conversation with Scott!

Why did you apply to the PhD in Social Welfare? Applying to the PhD in Social Welfare was always a goal for me. In going through my MSW program, there was a transformation in my thought process around the importance of research and policy. With this in mind, I entered the workforce focusing on the LGBTQ community as well as people living with HIV/AIDS. In doing significant community and individual work within these communities I found that their needs could really benefit from significant policy changes and that there was a significant lack of research for these communities that did not focus on a few key areas (mental health, substance use, sex behaviors, etc.). I wanted to be able to make a further reaching impact and decided the way to do that was getting my PhD and doing the research. To be honest, I thought it was a long shot and was very surprised with my acceptance but I am so happy to have this opportunity.



What do you want to do after you graduate? I would love to get a tenure-track position with an institution to teach and develop my research further. Additionally, I want to be able to partner with community based organizations to help provide them with research opportunities or program evaluations to further their missions and improve best practices.

What has been your favorite course so far as a student? Why? - I have two favorite courses. The first being my first course with the program, Development for Practice Knowledge. It was such a great introductory course to dip a toe in the waters of what being a PhD student means and it was a space that fully allowed me to explore my ideas for what I wanted to research and the different topics I was interested in. It was a great introduction to my cohort too! The second course was an Urban Education Seminar in Scholarly Communication that specifically focused on queering scholarly publication. It was an amazing seminar that provided great opportunity to share work, writing, and ideas. It was so interesting to see how students wanted to use queer theory or the concept of queering to explore new ways to disseminate scholarly information.

What leadership and/or employment positions do you hold within CUNY? - I am currently an Adjunct Lecturer with CUNY York focusing on the Health Education course titled: Health, Community, and Society.

What's something that people would be surprised to know about you? - I love reality competition television. I still watch shows like 'Survivor' and 'Big Brother'. It is so interesting to watch strangers navigate relationships while competing for a prize. I would love to go on 'Survivor'!

What is the focus of your research? - My research focuses on sexuality, sex positivity, and sexual health in numerous facets. In particular, I look at online paid sex work, LGBTQ health, and HIV stigma.

What are you currently reading, watching or listening to? - I have been engaging in a bunch of media lately (probably too much when I should be writing). Some highlights have been the TV shows 'The Traitors' and 'Percy Jackson' and the podcast 'How Did This Get Made'. Outside of that, I am trying to consume as much LGBTQ+ media as possible. So, if anyone has recommendations let me know!
